

## Specialty Sources: Videos, Documentaries, Images, Photos, etc.

### Online Video Recording (YouTube, TED Talk, etc.)

“Video and audio sources need to be documented using the same basic guidelines for citing print sources in MLA style. Include as much descriptive information as necessary to help readers understand the type and nature of the source you are citing. If the author’s name is the same as the uploader, only cite the author once. If the author is different from the uploader, cite the author’s name before the title” (*Purdue*).

### *Films, Movies, or Documentaries:*

“List films by their title. Include the name of the director, the film studio or distributor, and the release year. If relevant, list performer names after the director's name” (*Purdue*). \*For Online access, add the URL and the date of access.

*Title of the movie/video.* Produced by or Directed by (list producer or director’s name),

performances by (list performers if available), Publisher, year.

### **Using Images and Photos in Presentations:**

“The impact of images on one's ethos (credibility) cannot be understated. The illustrations you use, the charts or graphs that make up a presentation, and even the photographs you place within a design will have significant impact as to whether an audience takes you seriously” (*Purdue*).

### **Physical copy of a photograph (not posted online, includes personal photos):**

Person who took photo. “Name/describe the photo.” Photograph. *Location taken*. Date taken.

***\*If you utilize a photograph from an article, you must cite it separately on the Works Cited page. DO NOT assume that the article author is the photographer. Look around the page/site for “staff photographer” names if not listed under the picture.***

*Sponsor/Publisher, original publication date. Database. Access date.*
